Tips For How To Run The GLC Online

In response to the COVID-19 closures, your district and school has guidelines and platforms you must follow and use. The following are merely suggestions that align with GLC's suggested assignments.

Weekly Partner Calls

Students choose a partner for brainstorming, reflection and accountability. They should set the same day and time each week for a phone or video call. Suggested: Zoom

Weekly Class Call

 All students call in at the same time for class. You can run a Socratic-type conversation, do a check-in in or teach specific content. You can grade attendance by having students type their name in the chat area or participate in discussion. Suggested: Zoom

Weekly Reflection Assignments

- Leadership Content and Written Reflection
 - Send out an automatic survey on the same day each week with the same questions. Require students to turn it in by Friday. Suggested: Google Classroom, Google Forms.
 - What was the name of the leadership video, article or podcast you watched, read or listened to this week?
 - What did you learn from this about leadership?
 - How can you apply what you learned to your GLC final question prompt and life?
 - Students can post written reflections on social media with #GLChallenge to be a part of the conversation.

Video Reflection

- Students film a personal video reflection each week answering the same questions. Suggested: Students post on YouTube and post link on Google Classroom. They should use **#GLChallenge**.
 - What actions you took and why you wanted to do them?
 - Results of your experiments.
 - What you learned and how this impacts your answer to the question prompt?

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Final Product and Presentation

- Students should answer the Question Prompt with a final piece, parameters defined by you. Encourage creative answers in various forms like spoken word, songs, visual art, videos, essays, etc.
- Suggestion: Include a final presentation if possible

Teaching/Content Videos (As Needed)

- Anytime you need to teach students something specific (example: how to make a video). Suggested: Google Classroom
 - Create a video from your phone or computer and post it in your Google Classroom. Require students to fill out a few questions to prove that they watched it.

Announcements, Encouragement, Testimonials (As Needed)

• Use Google Classroom to make universal announcements.

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Suggested Accountability and Grading Pieces

2	Weekly Leadership Written Reflection.
3	Weekly video submissions. And be sure to tag us or mention us on your social posts to be featured on our website!
4	Weekly class call attendance and participation.
5	Final Product and Presentation.
6	Post social media content using #GLChallenge , comment on others' work.

Possible Final Presentations

- Presentations could still be in-person in late May, depending on the COVID-19 response.
- If this event cannot be live, students can present by submitting a video of a speech and turning in their final product: video, essay, piece of art, song, etc.
- Students should post their final products with **#GLChallenge** and **#GLCFinal** to inspire others.
